



APPLICANTS WHO GRADUATED FROM OTHER INTERNATIONAL UNIVERSITY PROGRAMS

This application package is for graduates from an international program (not an American ASHA-CAA accredited university program) who are not registered as an audiologist or speech-language pathologist in another Canadian regulated jurisdiction. Applicants in this category may be approved to practice under a provisional licence while they meet the entry-to-practice requirements (period of supervised practice and exam).

The CSASK provisional licence is intended as a transitional status to allow a person to obtain the necessary requirements for registration in the practising category and expires the earliest of:

- a) two years; or
- b) a failure for the third time to achieve a passing score on the CETP exam.

PRIOR TO STARTING YOUR APPLICATION:

- To avoid delays in processing your application, review the “Registration Requirements and Applications Information” document.
- All application forms are available under the “Application Forms” section at csask.ca.
- Information requested from a third-party, university, regulatory body or college, **must** be sent directly to the CSASK office.
- CSASK will only begin reviewing your application once payment of the **non-refundable** application and assessment fees, and **all** required documents have been received.
- CSASK will notify you if more information is required.

CSASK will only issue a practice permit once all the requirements for registration have been met (including payment of the licence fee).

PLEASE NOTE:

- Audiologists and speech-language pathologists **must be approved** for registration with CSASK prior to working/volunteering and using the professional titles in Saskatchewan.
- Start the application process early to allow for sufficient processing time, prior to the anticipated employment or volunteer start date.

APPLICATIONS ARE PROCESSED WITHIN FOUR TO SIX WEEKS ONCE PAYMENT AND ALL REQUIRED DOCUMENTS ARE RECEIVED.

TO APPLY COMPLETE THE FOLLOWING:

In addition to the information above, applicants must arrange for the following documents to be sent directly to CSASK by the third-party:	
English Language Proficiency	If you have not completed your entire education (academic and clinical) in English, complete one of the following third-party language assessments: <ul style="list-style-type: none">○ TOEFL (iBT)○ IELTS (AC or GC)
Official Convocated Transcripts	Request official convocated undergraduate and graduate transcripts.
Summary of Supervised Clinical Practice Hours Form	Download the <i>Summary of Supervised Clinical Practice Hours</i> form and provide it to the university for completion and submission.
Verification of Registration	Not required for new graduates. Required for applicants who are currently registered in another jurisdiction or for the most recent registration held.
Employer Verification of Currency	Not required for new graduates. Download the <i>Employer Verification of Currency</i> form and provide to a current or past employer to verify your practice hours in the most recent five years.
Third-Party Credential Assessment	Required for all education completed outside of Canada. Complete a course-by-course academic credential assessment of your bachelor's and master's degree by one of the following: WES, IQUAS or CES.
Document Translation	All original documents in languages other than English must be accompanied by official translations. Translations will only be accepted from the CSASK approved agencies: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• The consulate, high commission, or embassy (in Canada) of the country that issued the documents;• A Canadian consulate, high commission, or embassy in the country from which you emigrated;• A translator who is certified by a member organization of the Canadian Translators, Terminologists, and Interpreters Council (CTIC); or• A translator accredited by a federal, provincial, or municipal government in Canada.
